

**BERKELEY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE** is offering a full scholarship to two lucky candidates for the Electrical Lineworker Program (ELW) at Trident Technical College. All you need to do is apply at **berkeleyelectric.coop** under "Careers" before Oct. 31.

ELW is a 14-week training course that will help you gain the knowledge and skills necessary for you to begin your career in the electric utility industry.

Successful candidates will be given the opportunity to go through our Electrical Line Worker Third Class at Trident Technical College, free of charge. All necessary tools and materials will be covered by the co-op.

Students in the ELW program experience conditions like those on the job in the outdoor training lab constructed on-site at Trident Technical College's North Charleston campus. Students also receive expert classroom training in electrical theory and other subjects vital to launching their career as a lineworker and will graduate with a 3rd-class lineman certification. When not actively participating in a class at TTC, they will be working alongside one of our co-op crews in the field.

# **AUDITOR'S REPORT**

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States [...]

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion [...]

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated March 17, 2023, on our consideration of Berkeley Electric Cooperative, Inc. and Subsidiaries' internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters.

The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of Berkeley Electric Cooperative, Inc. and Subsidiaries' internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Berkeley Electric Cooperative, Inc. and Subsidiaries' internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

# Summerville teen part of winning podcast group

**LEILA BLACKWELL** saw her community come together to support a local family.

Her reflections on Summerville's response to the death of fellow teen Dillon Moody last December were a part of the winning production in an audio podcast scholarship competition sponsored by South Carolina's electric cooperatives.

Blackwell, a student at Lowcountry Acceleration Academy, teamed with Charlotte Beth Burns of Swansea and Alex Rosier of Estill to produce a short audio essay about what South Carolina means to them. The three high school juniors, each of whom will receive a \$5,000 college scholarship, focused on the communities of Summerville and Swansea, another town faced with the tragic death of a local teen.

"I was struck by not only how sad it was, but how supportive everyone was," Blackwell says of Summerville in the podcast. "The loss of a neighbor truly impacted everyone. This is what South Carolina is."

The winning group was selected by a panel of journalists that included Darci Strickland of WLTX-TV, Jeffrey Collins of The Associated Press, Sarah Ellis of The State newspaper and Victoria Hansen of South Carolina Public Radio.

"I heard some strong writing and strong storytelling," says Hansen. "I always enjoy it when podcasts and radio pieces bring in outside sound and mix in music. It can really make a piece come alive."

The three students were among a group of 43 student delegates from across the state who participated in the 2023 Cooperative Youth Summit, a four-day leadership experience that offers them the chance to learn more about state government and electric cooperatives.

Blackwell was sponsored by Berkeley Electric Cooperative. In addition to the winning team, two other Berkeley Electric student delegates were part of finalist groups selected as finalists in the competition, Janiyah Burns and J.J. Smith of Stratford High School and Jordan Smith of Goose Creek High School.
